



- 1. All voting membership ticket holders must be 18 yrs. old, Washington County Resident and purchased ticket at the fair office or from a director.
- 2. Refreshments will be furnished on the grounds at reasonable rates.
- 3. First Premium will be indicated by blue, the second premium by red, and the third premium by yellow.
- The election of directors will be held at the Fair Grounds, Saturday, week of the fair between the hours of 12 - 4pm.
- 5. Only residents of Washington County holding membership tickets prior to election may vote. Voting membership tickets must be purchased by Thursday, 10am of the fair. No tickets will be sold after that time. Members of the Association must declare their candidacy for the office of Director by filing with the secretary, a petition signed by ten or more members who are residents of the county in which the Association is organized. The petition must be received at least seven days before the day the annual election of Directors is held. Only candidates meeting these filing requirements will be eligible for the election as a director. The deadline for filing hour will be 5pm on the seventh day before the day of the election.
- 6. ALL ENTRIES MUST BE IN BY 8PM, WEDNESDAY, FOR RABBIT, FEEDER CALVES, POULTRY, AND MARKET DAIRY GOATS. ALL OTHER LIVESTOCK MUST BE IN PLACE BY 12PM ON THURSDAY.

NO SOLICITING OR ROVING VENDORS ARE PERMITTED DURING THE FAIR.

NO PERSON SHALL BE PERMITTED TO MAKE SOLICITATIONS OF ANY NATURE ON THE FAIRGROUNDS EXCEPT IN CONTRACTED CONCESSIONS OR COMMERCIAL RENTED SPACES.

NO PERSON SHALL BE PERMITTED TO POST OR DISPLAY SIGNS, DISTRIBUTE HANDBILLS OR ADVERTISING MATERIAL OR SELL OR DISTRIBUTE FREE, ANY MERCHANDISE, EXCEPT PERSONS UNDER CONTRACT.

NO BEER, WINE OR INTOXICATING LIQUOR WILL BE SOLD AT THE BARLOW INDEPENDENT FAIR.

The Fair Board records are made available to the public during meetings - 3rd Tuesday of each month at 7 PM and in the Fair Board office during the four days of the fair. Records are only kept for 10 years.

Animals other than those exhibited at the fair are NOT permitted on the Fairgrounds. Bicycles, Segways, Roller Blades, Roller Skates, Scooters, Skateboards and Laserpointers are NOT premitted.

The President shall appoint an auditing committee, consisting of three directors, to inspect and audit the books and accounts of the Secretary and Treasurer and report the results of its finding. Said report to show the sources of receipts and expenditures for the year. The object of this society shall be to promote the best interests agricultural and mechanical art, by disseminating useful information on the subject, securing funds and distributing in accordance with the premises of an act for the encouragement of Agriculture, passed February 27, 1846.

#### CONSTITUTION ARTICLE I

Sec.1. Name- This society shall be known as the Barlow Agricultural and Mechanical Association Incorporated of Washington County.

#### **ARTIĆLE II**

- Sec.1. This society shall consist of fifteen Directors who shall constitute a board for the general management of the society.
- Sec.2. Five of the Directors shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting of the society.

- Sec.3. The President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer shall be elected annually by the Board of Directors and shall hold their offices until their successors are elected.
- Sec.4. The annual meeting of the Board of Directors shall be held Thursday of the Fair, starting at 12 noon.
- Sec.5. The elections of directors will be held at the Fair Grounds, Saturday, week of the fair between the hours of 12pm - 4pm. Only members of the society are entitled to vote.
- Sec.6. When a vacancy occurs in the Board of Directors by death, resignation, non-attendance at the majority of regular meetings or removal from the county, the Board may fill the vacancy until the next annual meeting, when new member will be elected to fill unexpired term of vacating members.
- Sec.7. Members of this society eligible to vote are persons residing in Washington County and holding membership tickets for the current year and being 18 years of age.

#### **ARTICLE III**

- Sec.1. The annual exhibition of society shall be held on the last Friday, Saturday in September and the following Sunday.
- Sec.2. A majority of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

#### **BY LAWS**

- Article 1. Competitors for premiums at the Annual Fair, must be a member of this society and own the article to be exhibited.
- Article 2. An exhibitor who shall in any manner impose upon the society by offering an article or animal for competition at any Fair in violations of the rules of this society shall forfeit the premium if any be awarded.
- Article 3. Minors competing in open classes for full premium must hold membership ticket.
- Article 4. The Society will not be responsible in case of accidents.

#### ENTRY RULES

- 1st. A Marshal, the Superintendent and Awarding Committee of each class, of not more than three person each, shall be appointed by the Board of Directors, the vacancies to be filled during the Fair by the Superintendent of the Department and the member in charge.
- 2nd. The Marshal, during the Fair, under the direction of the Board of Directors, shall have charge of the grounds and of the police force, and with his aids shall preserve good order throughout.
- 3rd. Membership tickets are not transferable and will be forfeited if presented by persons not bona fide holders thereof.

#### ENJOY THE FAIR!

#### **ENTRY RULES**

- 4th-A. Pedigree of all registered stock over 1 year old must be presented when entries are made.
- 4th-B. All exhibitors are requested, as far as possible to mail the Secretary a correct list of their entries at least a week in advance of the dates of the Fair.
- 5th. Exhibitors must determine for themselves in what class or classes they will make entries, and are requested to have their articles or animals entered on the books of the Secretary before delivering them over to the Superintendent of different departments.
- 6th. An animal or article, having once been entered on the books of the Secretary, no change in the entry will be allowed except to correct an error herein and said correction must be made by the Secretary.
- 7th. Entries must state the exhibitor's name, article or animal offered, number of entry, department, class, age of animal (where it has not reached the age of maturity).
- 8th. No article or animal shall be permitted to compete for a premium unless owned in whole or in part by the persons offering the same, or by member of his or her family under 21 years. When owned by a minor the article or animal may be entered in the name of such minor.

- 9th. No person proposing to enter articles or stock for a premium shall be permitted to examine the entry book of the class he proposes to enter, and any and all persons so doing shall forfeit the right to enter therein.
- 10th. An animal can compete for a premium in but one class, except as one of a pair, or as fat animal, sweepstakes or in herd; no animal will be allowed to be exhibited in more than one herd, family, pair of sweepstakes class in which the animal has previously exhibited. Stallions are debarred from entering as one of a pair of driving or draft teams or as single carriage horses.
- 11th. No animal will be allowed to compete for a premium as a fat animal that is used for breeding purposes. Also an animal that has lost its power of breeding will be debarred from competing for a premium in classes where such qualities are considered.
- 12th. An animal may compete for as many premiums in the same class as it is eligible for competition.
- 13th. Horses must be exhibited in the ring for the inspection of the Awarding Committee; any person failing to do so exhibit shall forfeit all right to any premium thereon.

#### AWARDS


- 14th. No premiums shall be awarded to any animal or article for which no premium is offered, except in classes where it is otherwise specified, but the Awarding Committee shall recommend the same in writing to the Board of Directors with merits of said article plainly set forth.
- 15th. Where there is but one article or animal in a class the committee shall not give first premium unless worthy.
- 16th. No committeeman shall be permitted to act as such upon any animal or article exhibited by him or in which he has any interest.
- 17th. Any exhibitor interfering in any way whatever with the Awarding Committee in performance of their duties, or seeking to influence them in their awards, shall forfeit all right of a premium on that article or animal.
- 18th. The Board of Directors shall not interfere with the decision of the Awarding Committee.
- 19th. When a vacancy occurs in the Awarding Committee the Superintendent or Manager in Charge in that department will fill said vacancy by appointment.
- 20th. These rules may be amended or repealed at any meeting by a two-thirds vote of the Directors.


#### **MISCELLANEOUS**

- 21st. The Association will take every reasonable precaution to prevent injury or loss of article or stock entered for exhibition, after the arrival of the same on the Fairgrounds, but will not be responsible for any injury or loss that may occur to the same.
- 22nd. No Racing, Gambling or Intoxicating Liquors allowed on the grounds at the Fair time.
- 23rd. We propose to protect home dealers and home manufacturers, therefore the grounds will not be open to public or private sale of any questionable merchandise. All side games, such as Cane Racks, Wheel of Fortune and the sale of packages containing prizes, and similar nuisances are prohibited.
- 24th. No more than 3 persons in a booth at any time.
- 25th. Automobiles or other vehicles will not be permitted to occupy space or be driven near the buildings or within space prescribed by the Marshal. The police will promptly arrest all violators of this rule. Space will be provided for automobiles and other vehicles in suitable locations.
- 26th. Machinery, etc., will be given space for exhibit only.



Any equine animal which originates immediately and directly from Ohio may be exhibited at any Ohio exhibit of animals if it is not infected with or exposed to any dangerous, contagious or infectious disease.

Influenza immunization will be required. Annual afterwards. Proof of vaccination and health papers are required upon entering grounds. Out of state horses one year negative coggins. All exhibitors are asked to be certain that their animals are not infected with, or exposed to, any dangerous contagious or infectious disease. Please report any suspected illness to member in charge immediately.

#### RULES

- All General Rules heretofore published in this Premium list will be carefully adhered to with the exceptions so stated.
- Exhibitors of registered stock are required to furnish the member in charge for their approval, proof of registration, with all transfers of ownership brought up-to-date, or to show definite proof of their application for registration.
- A number will be assigned for each entry of exhibitor and must be displayed in the ring at time of judging.
- 4. Must be two entries to constitute a class.
- All classes will be judged in show ring, one class at a time. All exhibitors will be so notified when their class shows, and the exhibitor shall be responsible for getting his entry into the ring on time.
- During time of judging, no person will be allowed in the ring except ring attendants, judges, ring steward, and handlers of horses being judged.



- Horses are 14.2 hands (58") and over. Ponies are under 58". No ponies in Horse Classes, no horses in Pony Classes. Any exceptions are so stated.
- 8. All ponies and grade horses must be measured by member in charge and/or his assistants at time of entry.

Our insurance requires that Rules concerning Horses and Ponies at Barlow Fair be carefully observed.

- Horses and ponies will be allowed to enter the grounds through the gate on State Route 339 only, and must go directly to the barn in which they are to be kept.
- Horses and ponies are to be kept off all areas of the fairgrounds except the low road and the road to the rear of horse barn from large barn and the ring. They are to be kept away from congested and crowded areas especially during other Fair events.
- 3. Horses and ponies must be kept in their stalls except when being shown in events or when being exercised.
- Any person or persons violating the above rules is subject to disqualification and dismissal from the grounds.
- 5. All exhibitors must purchase a 4-H/FFA exhibitor pass
- 6. All horses must be in place by 12:00 pm Thursday

First bedding will be furnished. Exhibitors are asked to clean stalls before leaving.

All horses must be safely confined to stalls. No locks allowed. Smoking prohibited in all barns.

Exhibitors are asked to read carefully all Fair bylaws, rules and all Horse Department Rules before entering horses. Call or mail all stall requirements and send with reservations to Brooke Murphy, ph. 740-440-0597

Exhibits should be of show quality

In order for exhibitors to recieve their premium they must be a membership or season pass holder. If you do not wish to recieve your premium you do not have to be a passholder.

Potted plant section size limitations and specifications:

a. Single plant exhibits - An approx. area of 12"x12" will be provided for display. Pots should not exceed more than 10" across the top. Accessories are only premitted when used as support

**b.** Dish Garden and Fairy Gardens- An approx. area of 14"x14" will be provided for display. Dish Gardens should not exceed more than 12" at its greatest measurement across the top of the container. Cannot exceed 6" deep. Must have at least 3 different types, varieties, or cultivars of plants. Accessories are permitted. Specimen (cut flower) section specifications:

a. Must have been grown by Exhibitor.

b. Should be in clean, clear, and plain glass containers proportinally sized and large enough to provide adequate stability.

c. Should be ready to display by The Staging Committee by having been properly groomed, and a completed tag affixed to the container.

d.Large single bloom exhibits (under 3" diameter) should be disbudding, 1 stem per exhibit.

e. Small blooms, 3 per exhibit (under 3" diameter) should be disbudding, can be mixed or single colors.

f. Spray or multiple bloom - 1 stem per exhibit.

Artistic - Floral Design Specifications:

a. The work must be done by Exhibitor listed on the entry tag.

b. Exhibitor does not need to have grown the materials used in the Design.

c. Only dried materials can be painted.

d. **No** artificial (silk or plastic) representations of flowers/plants are allowed.

The Barlow Fair Tug Pull will be running Wolf Creek Tractor Pullers Club rules BUT pulling the Barlow Fair classes listed above. The entry fee is \$10 per hook.

### TRACTOR PULL RULES:

### GENERAL RULES: Tug Pull and Speed Pull

1. The "Wolf Creek Tractor Pullers Club" and/or the property owners or members of said groups are not responsible for any accidents or damage.

2. To be eligible to compete in any pulling event, except for the Waterford Fair and Barlow Fair, held by the Wolf Creek Tractor Pullers Club requires all pullers to be a paid member.

 Spectators and pullers not directly involved with the pull shall remain a safe distance from the track.
 All Club pulls are held as scheduled, starting with a driver meeting fifteen minutes before the starting time of the first class.

5. Any puller under the age of 18 must have written permission of a parent or guardian, and the parent or guardian must be present for that person to enter and pull.

- 6. No alcoholic beverages are allowed.
- 7. Open to any age tractor.

8. Sign up for each class will close after the first hook on the first weight of each class.

9. Wheelie bars are mandatory for ALL Divisions and all tug pulls. FOR ALL CLUB PULLS Minimum requirements for the wheelie bars are as follows: 10" maximum above the ground, the back of

65

the wheelie bar is to extend 5" behind the tire radius, pads will be at least a 5" square, spaced a minimum of 20" from outside of each pad. Stabilizer bar system must be able to support the weight of the tractor in the heaviest class pulled. Jacking up the pad so tractor is completely off the ground is a good test of the strength of the system's support ability. Track judges reserves the right to perform this test at its discretion.

10. Driver shall remain seated during the pulling attempt; with one hand on the throttle, clutch, or steering wheel and shall always operate his/her tractor in a safe and orderly manner and will not speed both on and off the track.

11. Pay-back per class for the club pulls will be 1st - 30%, 2nd - 20%, 3rd - 10%. One money place per tractor per class.

 Going out-of-bounds will result in no distance for that attempt. The tractor wheels, not the sled is judged.
 If anything falls off the tractor from the time of being hooked until the time of being unhooked, that tractor and driver will be disqualified for that attempt. Chain will be furnished by the Barlow Fair Board.

14. 3 track judges shall be appointed by the executive committee and the judges' decisions are final. The announcers stand will be exempt from any disputes. All questions will be handled on the track.

15. Contestants will provide a 3 3/4 -inch hole for hitching, with no more than 1-1/2 inches of distance between the rear of the hole and the rear of the hitch. The hitch must be stationary in all directions and remain stationary in all directions during each pull attempt and the hook and chain must hang freely. No three-point hitches allowed unless it is a component of the original equipment, i.e... Farmall Fast Hitch. Stabilizers or turnbuckles are allowed.

16. Pay pull back tractor maximum \$100.00 per pull plus fuel for the weight tractor.

17. Tractors with two drivers will be allowed to weight for the heaviest driver only.

### **TUG PULL RULES**

19. Classes will be: 3,500, 4,500, 5,500, 6,500, 7,500 and 8,500 9,500 # with 50 LB scale allowance.

20. All rear tractor tires shall be of the farm type, rotate in the correct direction and of normal wear. (Except for the Blacktop Pull) Tires shall not be altered in any other way. Not cut tires, chains, duels, 4-wheel drives or steel wheels will be allowed. Tire size will be a maximum of  $18.4 \times 38$ . 21. Distance of the pull will be 15 feet. Two attempts will be allowed 1 time per class. The first attempt must be made in pull order and in the direction of sled travel. The second pull can be taken immediately after the first, same direction as long as the sled is inside the end boundaries, if the sled has been pulled past the end boundaries with less than a full pull then the pull hooked to the sled can take a second attempt in the other direction. Drivers can drop in position on second attempts.

22. Track length and track width will be determined by the judges. Stakes will be placed on both ends of the track to mark the end boundaries. When any part of the sled goes past the end boundaries, the direction of the sled will be reversed. The entire sled, including the hooking eye, must be inside the end boundaries in order, for sled to be pulled past the end boundaries on any one attempt.

23. A front wheel shall touch the ground once during each full pull.

24. AFTER A TRACTOR HAS BEEN PARKED IN THE STAGING AREA, ADDING WEIGHTS OR BRACKETS WILL NOT BE PERMITTED WITHOUT THE APPROVAL OF A TRACK OFFICIAL. THE MOVEMENT OF EXISTING WEIGHTS WILL BE PERMITTED, EXCEPT AFTER THE LAST HOOK.

25. Front weight brackets and weight must not measure more than 12 feet from the center of the rear axle to front of the weights.

26. Drawbar height will be UNDER an 18-inch gauge for the 3,500, 4,500, 5,500, 6,500, 7,500, 8,500 and 9,500# classes. Only one attempt to back under the drawbar gauge and NOT TOUCH will be allowed; except when on the infield track or a cinder track, then two attempts can be made. Random checks of the drawbar height may be required by the track judge. Random checks will be announced from the announcer's booth, determined by a timing devise. The tractor hooked to the sled or backing up to the sled will be required to be checked when announced. An over height drawbar will result in immediate disqualification of that driver of that tractor in that class.

32. A driver can take a restart if stopped within the first 75 feet of the track.

33. Front weight brackets and weight must not measure more than 12 feet from the center of the rear axle to the front of the weights.

34. Track width will be determined by track officials.




